## Celebrating Care Leavers – Making a Difference Together Conference





In March, members of SiCC and SLCC MC-ed at the 'Celebrating Care Leavers – Making a Difference Together' Conference, which was held at the Canalside in Bridgwater. Member of SiCC and SLCC, Amber-Jane wrote this article about the event.

SiCC and SLCC attended a care leavers conference on the 12th March. The conference was about why it is so important that care leavers need access to employment or training. Many incredible employers attended the conference and provided some amazing opportunities and ways to help care leavers. One of those employers was Mulberry. They made two pledges. The first one



was a financial pledge which is their promise to help fund programmes that directly benefit care leavers. Their second pledge was a stepping stone pledge which is them promising to provide opportunities for care leavers to gain

independence and advance in their careers. They also promised £5,000 for a care leavers fund.

We had a young person who has care experience share his experience since leaving care. Connor shared his journey through care and his struggles throughout his journey. Connor found an amazing opportunity after care by signing up to Camp America. This began his journey of travelling and he went on to travel to Australia and has plans to travel more around the world. Connor said "his



present is not defined by his past". He wants to find ways to fund travel for a young person in care.

SiCC and SLCC asked participants to write their own pledges to care leavers. Some of the pledges are offering exciting opportunities in their employment such as work experience and to build more funding for the care leavers fund. They want to widen the world of employment and

highlight the positives young people can bring to the job.

The conference provided some amazing opportunities to hear from lots of different employers and ways they pledge to help young people find a career they love. We had some amazing feedback on the conference, Harriet Gardiner from Mulberry said "the organisation of the day has been incredible and the speakers have all given some memorable speeches". Heather, who is the lead member of the Children, Families and Education also said "we should never underestimate young people, they have such a range of personalities, but they need the environment to flourish". We also had an amazing singer, Rayah, who sang her own song 'Promises' which had everyone in tears.

### Members of SiCC and SLCC give input on Judges Toolkit – Update!

In November members of SiCC and SLCC looked over a draft of a Judges Toolkit for the Nuffield Family Justice Observatory (NFJO), giving their recommendations on ways it could be improved.

The toolkit was sent back to the NFJO, where the President of the Family Division reviewed it, taking into consideration the comments from SiCC and SLCC. There was some incredibly positive feedback from professionals who have looked at the group's input on the project.

The President of the Family Division and the Family Justice Young People's Board will be making the final changes to the toolkit and publishing it within the next month or two, and are really excited about the potential changes this work might bring about and are incredibly grateful to the members of SiCC and SLCC who have contributed.

The Toolkit was published on the 26th February, and the President of the Family Division had this to say about young people's contributions to the Toolkit:

"I am very grateful to all who have been involved in developing this most valuable resource, but I would particularly like to thank the young people who have contributed. Their endorsement of what is said here should give judges solid confidence that, if they follow these guidelines, they are likely to produce a message that will be of real and lasting value to the young person who has been the centre of their concern."

### Care Experienced Young People shape new Corporate Parenting Strategy

The Somerset Corporate Parenting Board has unveiled its new strategy, co-written with children in care and care leavers. This strategy outlines Somerset Council's guidelines and aims to ensure that children and young people in care are nurtured to grow and thrive.


The 2025-28 Somerset Corporate Parenting Strategy asks, 'Would This Be Good Enough for My Child?'. When a child enters the care of Somerset Council, the responsibilities that would normally belong to a parent become the legal and moral duty of everyone at the Council and its partners, making them Corporate Parents.

The Strategy is built around seven key responsibilities:

- 1. Ensuring health
- 2. Giving young people a voice
- 3. Assessing their needs
- 4. Taking a trauma-informed approach
- 5. Having high aspirations for them
- 6. Being rights-based
- 7. Providing stability and security

These responsibilities guide the Council's actions for children and young people in care over the next few years. The Corporate Parenting Board monitors, challenges, and influences the services Somerset Council and its partners deliver to continually improve outcomes.

Working with members of the Somerset in Care and Somerset Leaving Care Council (SiCC and SLCC), a Pledge was developed, symbolised by a sunflower to reflect happiness, admiration, optimism, honesty, and resilience.



A member of SiCC and SICC said:

"The Pledge is like a sunflower as it's striving for brightness, always looking for the sun and finding the light."

In addition to the new Strategy and Pledge, a short film was produced by SiCC, SLCC, and the Somerset Council Engagement and Participation team. This film will be used for Corporate Parent training for all new staff and Councillors.

Cllr. Heather Shearer, Lead Member for Children, Families and Education, said:

"I'm delighted to support the launch of the new Corporate Parenting Strategy for Somerset that runs until 2028. This strategy, co-produced by the Corporate Parenting Board and young people of SiCC and SLCC, reflects the principles of the national 'Stable Homes, Built on Love' strategy, promoting the health, well-being, hopes, and wishes of all care-experienced children and young people.

"The Board encourages everyone at Somerset Council and our partners to undertake the refreshed Corporate Parenting training to ensure we all answer the guestion – 'Would This Be Good Enough for My Child?'"

SiCC and SLCC is a group for young people in care and care leavers in Somerset, enabling them to have a voice to challenge and shape the services they use.

## Member of SiCC and SLCC speaks at the Future of Supported Accommodation conference



Leon Isaac, a member of the Somerset Leaving Care Council was invited as keynote speaker at the Commissioners Conference – The Future of Supported Accommodation at the Birmingham Conference and Exhibition Centre on 4 March 2025.

Leon was asked to talk about the work of Somerset in Care and Leaving Care Councils (SiCC and SLCC) on Principles of Care that they undertook with the Nuffield Family Justice Observatory (NFJO). As well as talking about the project and its outcomes, Leon told the 200 strong audience of commissioners and providers about the benefits of young people having a voice – for organisations and for the young people themselves. His presentation was the final keynote speech of a very informative and interesting conference, where Leon had also co-facilitated a workshop with Dr Beverley Barnet Jones of the NFJO.

### Kieran meets the Prime Minister over Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill

Recently Kieran, member of SiCC and SLCC went up to London and met Prime Minister Kier Starmer at the House of Commons over the Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill 2024-25, a Bill designed to improve the safeguarding of children and to raise education standards.

While at Westminster, Kieran shared his thoughts and voiced his experiences of being a young person who has been both a child looked after and a care leaver in a speech. During his speech he also talked about the hard work that SiCC and SLCC do to raise the profile of young people in the care system, to challenge services and help them meet the needs to care experienced young people.

In addition to meeting Prime Minister Kier Starmer, Kieran also met Members of Parliament Jess Asato and Munira Wilson.

Kieran said of the experience: "I wanted to make a change to unfunded care and schools, make all of us be heard and noticed. It was amazing to meet the Prime Minister, I actually had a little chat with him, so that was really nice to talk someone who is running the country. It was once in a lifetime."

# It's a quit tool not a cool tool

If you don't smoke, don't vape

Young people who vape may experience the following side effects:



Shortness of breath



Coughing



Headaches



Dry mouth



Sore throat

The long-term effects are still unknown.

Most vapes contain nicotine, a highly addictive drug that's easy to get hooked on and hard to stop.

**Myth Busting:** Vaping doesn't relieve stress, it can actually increase stress and anxiety. Nicotine withdrawal may cause irritability, sleep problems, and trouble concentrating.

Vaping is only recommended as a quit tool for adults who smoke, and it is illegal for nicotine vapes to be sold to anyone under 18 years old.
